The Humanities Department, on the recommendation of the Global Engagement Committee, proposes the establishment of a university wide Global Studies Minor housed within the Department of Humanities in the College of Humanities and Social Sciences.

The Global Studies Minor will provide multidimensional interdisciplinary education in the principal issues confronting today's globalized world, in order to prepare Dixie State University students to become global leaders in business, education, government, and the non-profit sector. The program will help students develop the ability to work with people from other cultures, learn and develop intercultural communication skills, learn foreign languages and apply academic credit for study abroad toward a degree. Hart Research Associate's employer surveys conducted on behalf of the American Association of Colleges and Universities, revealed that in 2014 86% of employers indicated intercultural skills and global understanding should be a central aim of college learning in the 21st century. Currently DSU does not offer any program in Global or International Studies. As DSU's academic programs have continued to increase, students are requesting programs which can help them get better connected to the world.

As a university-wide endeavor, Global Studies will benefit Dixie State University's advancement towards becoming a globally engaged campus through:

- Increased interdisciplinary offerings (among the social sciences, business, education, science and technology, the arts, and humanities)
- Broadened cross-cultural dialogue
- Heightened global competencies
- Enhanced multiple perspectives in the classroom, particularly of underrepresented cultures and societies
- International and cross cultural literacy (including music dance, drama, visual arts, and literature)
- Encouragement of second (or multiple) language learning
- Exposure to and discussion of international issues
- Informed and responsible global citizenship
- Forging of partnerships with nonprofit organizations, business, and constituent groups

The proposed Global Studies minor will be the first program of its kind at Dixie State University. The Global Studies program is a perfect fit with the active learning model of teaching and learning adopted at Dixie State University.

All but one of the courses included in the Global Studies minor are currently taught at DSU. The proposed minor in Global Studies will have no negative institutional effect, and no administrative changes will be needed. Further, administrative structures and the organizational structure within the institution will not be affected by approval of this minor. The one course created for the Global Studies minor will be titled "GLS 1010: Intro to Global Studies" and will be housed within the Humanities Department.

We anticipate this to be a popular minor for students, and as such there will be some increase in enrollment incurred by offering students in other programs the opportunity to get enrolled in the Global Studies minor. Our current course loads will absorb these additional students. In addition to the benefits outlined above, the Global Studies minor serves as a catalyst for meeting DSU Strategic Planning goals which call for curriculum-based avenues to increase intercultural knowledge and competence.
